Uncovered

Sometimes an excavation project uncovers unexpected treasures. Such was the case for the City of Santa Fe when they began to replace the old water mains, water meters and "meter cans," now known as meter pits, in a neighborhood that was developed prior to 1940.

The Office of Archaeological Studies of the Museum of New Mexico worked with the Santa Fe Water Division to preserve any artifacts uncovered during the water system updates. During the project, Ford lids were discovered along with several other items of interest.

Karen Wening, Staff Archaeologist, shared a few of the items found in the oldest meter cans - "a miniature porcelain caterpillar figurine, an old nailed leather shoe heel (1862 - 1926), a pair of Art Deco style eyeglasses (1920s - 1930s), and an amber glass medicine bottle

with an Owens-Illinois maker's mark (1929 - 1954)." In addition to these items, a Ford Meter Box lid was also discovered in one of the meter cans.

In an effort to date the meter cans and lid, archaeologists located an announcement in the *Santa Fe New Mexican* newspaper dated September 29, 1928. This announcement detailed the first stage of water main updates for the area. Another update would follow in 1944.

Since water metering did not occur in Santa Fe until 1930, it is likely the Ford Meter Box lids were installed shortly after the 1928 water mains were buried.

The Ford Meter Box lid discovered inside one of the meter cans will be on display in a small museum recently set up by the Santa Fe Water Division.
