Several of those employees decided to organize a memorial cruise-in with all proceeds dedicated to raising awareness about ALS. A few months later, the first Dave Kunkel Cruise-In was held in Wabash, Indiana. This year, the third Kunkel Cruise-In continued to attract hundreds of cars, trucks, and motorcycles, raising thousands of dollars for ALS research.
