One morning, in about 1916, when the Ford family lived in Wabash, Indiana at the southeast corner of Miami and Pawling Streets, Edwin Ford came to the breakfast table after a sleepless night because of a bout with sciatica. Edwin had suffered with an inflammation of the sciatic nerve for several years and back and leg pains plagued him. His cheerfulness and optimistic attitude rendered the family's sympathy useless and so, said one of his sons, "We soon stopped feeling sorry for him."

On this particular morning, Edwin left the table as the dishes were cleared away, and he went into the living room where he picked up the top of a white wood box containing a set of chessmen. He seated himself in a chair and began sketching. What emerged in the drawing was the design of an Expansion Connection for
